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




How to Get There?

KUŞADASI

Kuşadası whose history dates back to 3000 BC and which has hosted various civilizations since ancient times, is one of Türkiye's most important centers for sea and cultural tourism. Kuşadası offers a wide range of tourism activities with its stunning sunsets, Blue Flag beaches, historical and cultural richness, national park, and thermal facilities. Especially noted for its proximity to the ancient city of Ephesus, Kuşadası is a unique destination where you can enjoy both cultural experiences and the sea, sand, and sun.

Traces of the Past

Kaleiçi Streets and Kaleiçi Bazaar:

Dating back to ancient times, Kaleiçi is a district with three gates, surrounded by caravanserais and city walls. Today, only one gate remains, noted for its historical texture. Inside, you will find a maze of streets filled with bars, cafes, shops, and restaurants. The Kaleiçi Bazaar is a large market selling carpets, leather, textiles, and souvenirs. You can enjoy live music in the restaurants and bars.

Öküz Mehmet Pasha Caravanserai:


In 17th century ordered to built by Grand Vizier Öküz Mehmet Pasha, this structure is located right across from the Kuşadası Port. It resembles a small inner fortress and today serves as a hotel and touristic facility, also hosting exhibitions and events.

Kaleiçi Mosque:

In 1618 ordered to built by Öküz Mehmet Pasha, the mosque underwent a major renovation in 1830. Located in Kaleiçi, the mosque stands out with its magnificent dome and geometric plaques.

Güvercinada Castle:

Güvercinada Castle, located at the entrance of the Kuşadası Bay, was built by Barbaros Hayrettin Pasha to protect the harbor. Listed on UNESCO's Tentative World Heritage List, the castle impresses visitors with its historical texture and stunning views.





Dilek Peninsula National Park:

This peninsula, where the mountains, sea, and forest converge, is a breathtaking display of all shades of blue and green. The national park can be accessed through Davutlar town and features attractions like Zeus Cave, endemic plants, and four beaches. Activities in the area include sport fishing, hiking, bird watching, and photography.

Marina and Cruise Port:

Kuşadası Marina has the capacity to serve 428 boats at sea and 130 on land. The Kuşadası Cruise Port is one of Türkiye's busiest and welcomes visitors year-round.

Kadınlar Beach:

This Blue Flag beach is the most famous beach in Kuşadası. It is located 3 km from the center and is easily accessible by public transport. The 1-kilometer-long sandy beach offers sunbed rentals.

Davutlar Beach:

Located 19 kilometers from Kuşadası, Davutlar Beach sits where the blue sea meets the forest. The natural park's beaches and walking trails offer visitors an alternative vacation option.

Underwater World and the Plane Wreck:

Kuşadası is a favorite for diving enthusiasts due to its rich underwater flora and fauna. In 2016, an Airbus A300 passenger plane was deliberately sunk, making it the world's largest plane wreck and a popular dive site. You can join diving tours with professional dive clubs.

Oleatrium - Olive Oil Museum and Farm:

Located 20 minutes from Kuşadası, Oleatrium is a museum dedicated to olive and olive oil culture. The museum narrates the history of olive oil production technology and its uses in a storytelling style. Souvenir products, olive oils, and wines are available for purchase at the museum.

Historical Kuşadası Houses:

Kuşadası is famous for its historic houses and narrow streets. These homes, reflecting the cultural diversity of the 19th century, have been preserved to this day and invite you to stroll through the corridors of history.

Gastronomy:

The cuisine of Kuşadası resembles the rich culinary traditions of Aydın. In addition to local dishes and fresh seafood, figs, grapes, and olives are the most famous products of Kuşadası. You can enjoy fresh fish and mezes at seaside fish restaurants. Olive oil dishes, soups, seafood, citrus fruits, marmalades made from bitter oranges, wines from figs and grapes, and traditional sweets are among the essential flavors of Kuşadası's cuisine.
